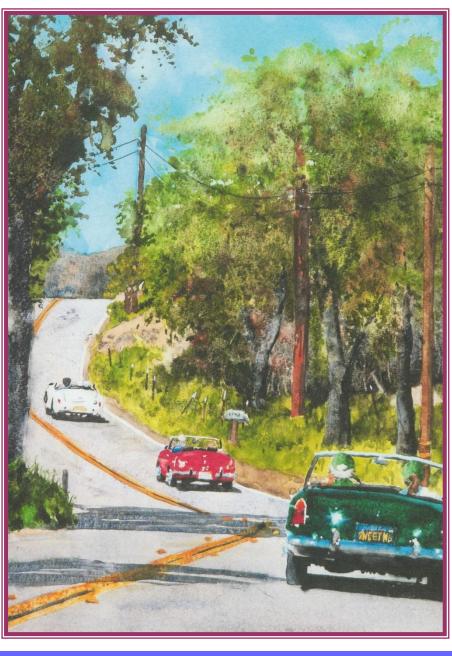

Recipe

Saxe-Coburg Soup

The base of this soup is Brussels sprouts and was named in honor of Prince Albert, who came from Saxe-Coburg and was very partial to the vegetable. The very small sprouts sold in Costco are perfect for this soup or you may use the small frozen sprouts from the supermarket. This soup will even win over sprout haters as it is so very good.

Ingredients

1oz butter

1 medium onion, finely chopped

2 medium potatoes, peeled and diced

4 cups of chicken stock

1 tblsp of sugar

1 pound of small Brussels sprouts (trim stalks and remove outer leaves)

1 ½ cups of cream

2 oz cooked ham, finely diced

½ cup of sherry

Salt

Freshly ground black pepper.

Method

Melt the butter in a good-sized saucepan. Add the onion and cook until translucent but not brown. Add the potatoes, stock, sugar and sprouts.

Bring to the boil, lower the heat and simmer for about 15mins or until the potatoes and sprouts are tender.

Remove the soup and puree it in a blender or using a kitchen wand before returning it to the same saucepan. Stir in the cream, ham and sherry and season to taste with the salt and pepper. If serving hot, heat it gently, do not let it boil. Chill it in the refrigerator for several hours if you plan to serve it cold as it tastes great either way.

From my workbench.

One of the many jobs I've had in my automotive career was doing promotional work for S.E.V. Marchal. Marchal was a French corporation that produced accessory lighting for cars, trucks and motorcycles. I went to various races and serviced and promoted their products. I learned a lot about automotive lighting while assisting endurance road racing and off road racing teams. The products I promoted were European and for the most part illegal for use on California highways. Back then everything on the road came with the horrible incandescent sealed beam headlight. Much different is the modern aerodynamic plastic headlights that come on modern cars. But wait, our M.G.s are far from being modern. We are blessed with those horrible incandescent sealed beams. But we have options, what I have done is updating my headlights to European specifications with a pair of illegal Lucas European halogen headlights. The improvement is dramatic! But not enough to arouse law enforcement. Halogen headlights come in two varieties; legal sealed beam halogens which still have horrible optics that waste most of the light output up in the sky. Illegal (except on motorcycles) European halogens have a replaceable "H-4" bulbs which are available in two brightness levels 60/55 watt and 100/80 watt. The 60/55 watt bulbs are more than ample, the higher wattage bulbs don't produce as much of an increase as the numbers would lead you to believe. These European lamps have far superior optics that produce an excellent beam pattern that puts the light on the road and not in the oncoming traffics eyes. But these lamps draw more current than the original sealed beams so a couple of relays are called for. A relay is a simple device that is essentially a remote switch. The relay is controlled by a low current from the headlight switch, the relay then switches the higher current to the headlights. Very easy to add to the stock wiring. But back to halogen, halogen is a gas which is used inside the light bulbs. The advantage to halogen vs. sealed beams. In the imperfect vacuum of a sealed beam as the incandescent bulb filament burns it emits particles that deposit on the lamp and the filament, this gradually decreases its light output. Halogen gas allows the filament to retain its output with only negligible degradation.

European headlamps also allow the use of very modern solid state LED headlamp bulbs. An LED is a light emitting diode: as electrons flow across the anode and cathode light is emitted. These bulbs require "polarity drivers" which push the price above \$150 not including the headlamps.

The other option is HID headlamp bulbs, you may have been blinded by these bulbs installed in a modern car with aerodynamic plastic headlamps. High Intensity Discharge bulbs consist of two electrodes that an arc of current travels between. A quick search on EBAY showed various kits with bulbs and drivers in the \$30 to \$50 range, available in various tints even pink. My opinion: awful except in headlamps designed with optics designed for this bulb.

Now for my recommendation. As you can guess I like the euro headlamps and even though I used to sell French lights I have Lucas lamps in my LBCs. The very cool Lucas PL Tripods are available on EBAY at reasonable prices, I found a new pair with bulbs for \$70 last May. They look great in my dog sitters Cobra replica..

Aiming headlights is something that rarely gets done nowadays unless the vehicle is a rebuilt "total". A quick check on the internet produced many state licensed lamp inspection shops. If you have legal headlamps there are 3 little bumps on your head lamps where the aiming device is attached. It you have Euro headlamps an optical aimer is required and these are very rare. I know a guy who has one and I'd be happy to do yours at no charge to club members. Maybe a lamp upgrade tech session with relay and lamp installation followed with lamp aiming is in the future. Let me know if you are interested.

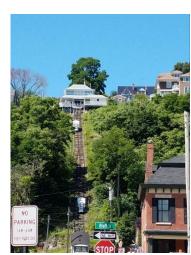

Arseing About in the "A" Or Lessons Were Learned.

She who must be obeyed suggested a trip the Ventura area for the weekend and surprised me by suggesting we take the "A" coupe. Never one to let the grass grow under my feet, I had the car out, prepped and washed by the time of our departure time mid Friday afternoon.

Lesson /1 Never and I mean never head north from San Diego on a Friday afternoon. The I5 was blocked at Del Mar due to the races so we ambled up the US 101 (our preferred route in the MG anyway). We made it to Leucadia where we found the road blocked off in both directions by the Sheriff's Dept so back to the I 5 which was thankfully moving, albeit very slowly. We finally made it to the 73 toll road for a great run on a nice smooth road, even the Highway Patrolman I passed at over 80mph just waved at me to slow down rather than give me a ticket (they are on the whole mostly good guys). Then we hit Costa Mesa on the I 405 and stopped. One hour and one mile later we were starting to cook in the hot sun. The car was fine, sitting in 190-200 degF and

not going any higher. It took nearly 2 more hours to clear LAX and get on the I10 for Santa Monica. Once past the Santa Monica pier which included revving the engine in the freeway tunnel with the windows down (never gets old) we had a good but slow run up the US1. That was until we hit Malibu and found the road again blocked by the local constabulary. After a short but frustrating hold up, we were again off to a relatively clear road and that lovely drive up the coast to Point Mugu and Oxnard, so all was right with the world again on a twisty road with that cool sea breeze blowing in the windows. We finally made our AirBnb in Oxnard, tired but happy again after the final great stretch.



Lesson /2 American diners serve large portions so do not try to eat it all. An early start at a Diner called Henri's Café saw me order the chicken fried steak (a fav of mine). The diner was full of locals which is always a good sign and served spectacularly good coffee. A short time later the waitress came staggering out under a huge plate that had my breakfast on it. I did manfully try to finish it but it did beat me into submission, a delicious beating but a beating none the less. So, for-

tified with good food and coffee we ambled our way into Ventura and then on to Ojai. This town is one of my favorite places to spend time. Small with interesting stores and more good coffee. After looking through a few galleries and antique stores the boss went to have a wine tasting while I chatted to a local in a lovely Triumph Tr3. It was a 30yr old restoration but still immaculate even though it was quite often used to scoot around the area. About mid afternoon the temp in Ojai suddenly spiked into triple digits so we headed back to Ventura by route 150 that passes Lake Casitas and joins the US101 at Carpinteria Beach. A neat winding and scenic road that is just perfect for a MG.



<u>Lesson /3 If you want to buy antiques and stuff, take a bigger car</u>. Back in Ventura we ambled around the shops stopping for the odd snack in-between rooting through the plethora of thrift and antique stores. Found a few great items but alas they would not fit into the "A" so they stayed

where they were (I do miss my MGB GT as you can stash all sorts of junk in those). We headed out to Seaward to have dinner at our favorite fish and chips shop only to find it had recently closed so I had to drown my sorrows with a Guinness and a burger across the road, life is so gut wrenchingly hard at times. The next day was more of the same with a very light breakfast this time as I do not think my arteries could handle two diner breakfasts so close together. After a look around the Ventura Marina and a walk on the beach we dawdled back home to San Diego the way we came with no hold ups at all which made for a nice drive.



Lesson /4 Get a wheel alignment. I was most pleased with the way the car behaved. No overheating or any other transgressions. The way the car tracked could have been a lot better due to the fact I neglected to have a wheel alignment after fitting the new tires (which are great) so it did tramline a bit more than usual on the freeway and was not as clean as usual through really fast corners. But all in all, a great weekend and close enough that it is not a major undertaking to pop up in your classic, just don't leave on a Friday afternoon.

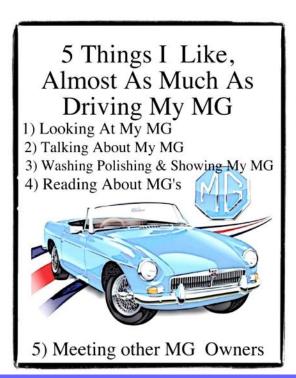

In the past, we required a certain number of cars to be registered in a class, to hold that class. If it did not reach that threshold, the class was merged, and that was an unpopular situation. This year, if even one car shows up for a class that we offer, there will be a first place awarded. A second place requires four cars to be on the field, and a third place requires seven. However, no classes will be merged this year. The class list, as we have published it, will stand. This is a good time to consider whether you or a friend might have a rare car, that usually doesn't come out because there is no class for it. Look at our class list here, and see if you might have an entry that you hadn't considered. The trophies this year are engraved glass beer mugs, both decorative and useful. There will also be special trophies for Mini and Lotus classes, which are sponsored.

Registration is open now, and all registrations must be received by October 6th. You can register with Paypal, and pay in advance, or without Paypal, and pay when you check in. If you order a shirt or two, you will pick them up when you check in. This year, the shirts have the graphic on the back, and a pocket and logo on the front. See the website for photos.

All non-show cars will be required to pay the meters, keep that in mind, please. That's the City of San Diego, and they will definitely be patrolling. Show cars park on the grass and are exempt.
